FWP SEEKS COMMENT ON PROPOSED BISON HUNT ISSUES

BOZEMAN—Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks is seeking public comment on issues to explore as it develops a hunting season proposal for bison that migrate out of Yellowstone National Park.

In 2003, Montana's Legislature passed SB395, which gave the FWP Commission authority to establish a bison hunt in Gallatin and Park counties. The commission recently directed FWP to prepare an environmental review for a proposed hunt, which must begin with a public effort to identify issues that may need to be addressed.

"As we move toward developing a bison hunting season, we want to invite Montanans and others to help us identify the benefits and challenges of such a proposal," said Kurt Alt, FWP's wildlife manager in Bozeman.

After public review of an environmental assessment, which will be developed over the coming spring and summer, a recommendation on whether or not to establish a hunt could come by fall, officials said.

The intent of the law authorizing the hunt is to allow Montana hunters to harvest wild, freeroaming bison under fair chase conditions and to reduce damage to private property by altering bison behavior and distribution. Officials said the proposed hunt is not expected to regulate bison populations. Population regulation will continue to be achieved through the Interagency Bison Management Plan.

FWP is seeking comment on all bison-related hunting issues, including:

- Bison population impacts
- Ethics of hunting bison
- Proposed brucellosis vaccination program on edibility of meat
- Hunting logistics, including boundaries, timing, weapons, and licensing
- Public safety
- Exposure of hunters to brucellosis
- Property damage by hunters and bison
- Impacts on other activities and species, including threatened and endangered species and activities described in the Interagency Bison Management Plan

SENATE BILL 395 - BISON HUNT - 2003 Session

Key Points.

- The bison hunt is at the discretion of the DFWP.
- The bison hunt may not be initiated by the DFWP without the authorization and concurrence of the Dept of Livestock and the state veterinarian.
- The DFWP bison hunt rules must contain provisions for "fair chase".

AN ACT

- 1. PROVIDING FOR THE SPORT HUNTING OF WILD BUFFALO OR BISON AS A MANAGEMENT TOOL THROUGH ESTABLISHMENT OF A SPECIAL WILD BUFFALO OR BISON LICENSE.
- 2. ESTABLISHING REGULATIONS RELATED TO THE SPECIAL WILD BUFFALO OR BISON LICENSE
- 3. SETTING A PRICE FOR THE LICENSE.
- 4. CLARIFYING DUTIES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF FISH, WILDLIFE, AND PARKS IN ADMINISTERING THE SPECIAL WILD BUFFALO OR BISON LICENSE, INCLUDING CONSULTATION AND COOPERATION WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF LIVESTOCK IN DEVELOPING AND IMPLEMENTING RULES REGARDING THE SAFE HANDLING OF WILD BUFFALO OR BISON PARTS.

The Legislature intends that the provisions of the special wild buffalo or bison license be administered and implemented by the Department of Fish, Wildlife, and Parks, after consultation with the Department of Livestock, regarding the management of wild buffalo or bison that have been designated as a species in need of disease control.

- DFWP rules must be adopted in cooperation with the Department of Livestock
- Rules must include
 - License drawing and fees (\$75 for resident--\$750 for nonresident)
 - Notice of where to hunt but only generally
 - o Provisions for fair chase hunting including hunting only on foot and away from public roads and that no specific animal may be designated for harvest.

Bison hunts implemented by DFWP are only 1 of 3 methods for managing bison for disease control.

Bison hunts may be permitted <u>only</u> with the authorization of the Department of Livestock and the concurrence of the state veterinarian.

"The department (of DFWP) may, after agreement and authorization by the department of livestock, authorize the public hunting of wild buffalo or bison that have been exposed to or infected with a contagious disease pursuant to Section 87-2-730, MCA." (Section 87-1-216 (2) (c), MCA)

Contact Points with Decision-Makers for Bison Environmental Review (February 6, 2004)

- The Director of Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks (FWP) and the Executive Director of the Montana Board of Livestock are the joint decision-makers on the environmental review for the proposed bison hunt.  - o The public issues are summarized following scoping;
 - o Alternatives are drafted:
 - o Environmental assessment is drafted but not yet sent out to public;
 - o After comments summarized on draft and before final decision.
