- 00:00: 20 Rep. Hunter made the motion to approve of the EAIC June 29,2010 minutes. The motion **passed.** Sen. Hansen voted aye by proxy.
- 00:00:33 Rep. Vance requested that another EAIC meeting take place. The committee discussed dates and agreed to have a last meeting on September 3, 2010.

- 00:08:02 Sen. Keene talked about workers' compensation and said the 2011 Legislature needs to do something on work comp because Montana's current ranking can't continue (as highest or nearly highest in the nation for premiums).

Review of Fiscal Analysis of LMAC package

- 00:09:04 Ms. Wilkinson provided an informal financial analysis of the LMAC bill draft.

 (Exhibit 1) She reviewed the estimates of the National Council on
 Compensation Insurance (NCCI) and estimates provided by the Department of
 Labor and Industry (DLI).
- 00:36:46 Mike Taylor and Raji Chadarevian of NCCI discussed the LMAC bill draft, LC lmac. (Exhibit 2) Mr. Taylor reviewed the impact of the medical fee, but said he does not have fixed numbers at this time for Montana. Ms. Murdo distributed several handouts providing information from NCCI.
 - An analysis of LMAC dated 7/30/2010. (Exhibit 3)
 - A reform proposal from LMAC. (Exhibit 4)
 - Comparison of NCCI and LMAC/ERD financial impact. (Exhibit 5)
- O0:42:06 Dr. Phillip Steele, Helena, served on a DLI-appointed committee that reviewed the proposed utilization and treatment guidelines. He talked about: 1) standardization of all guidelines, 2) timely access to physicians, 3) consistency, and 4) progression to return-to-work programs. He stated it will take several years for changes to take effect.

Panel Members from the LMAC committee

- 00:49:51 Bob Worthington, representing the management side of LMAC, distributed a handout that provides an update of the LMAC analysis. **(Exhibit 6)**. He reiterated that the process is change, and there is resistance to change. He urged the committee to approve the bill draft, LClmac, so it can go forward to the 2011 Legislature.
- O0:58:51 Jason Miller, representing the labor side of LMAC, gave labor's reasoning for why the proposed bill draft (Exhibit 2) is a good bill. He referred to Exhibit 5 regarding the comparison of costs from NCCI and LMAC/ERD.
- O1:07:03 Jerry Keck, administrator of the Employment Relations Division (ERD), DLI, explained the changes for workers' compensation in the bill draft, LClmac, Exhibit 2.
- 01:10:51 Frank Neuhauser, University of California-Berkeley, presented information of the average earnings and losses of injured workers, the distribution of the proposed compensation changes, and the current medical fee schedule costs. (Exhibit 7)
- 01:15:02 Mr. Keck said there are sections of the bill that do not show costs/payments at this time because the department has not yet determined the rates.
- 01:20:11 The committee asked Mr. Worthington, Mr. Miller, and Mr. Keck about whether

they would stand behind this bill draft, LClmac, when it is presented to the 2011 Legislature. Mr. Keck, Mr. Worthington and Mr. Miller assured Sen. Keane and the committee that they will be diligent in supporting this bill draft.

O1:23:46 The committee discussed the estimated \$150 million in cost savings, and if the businesses that pay premiums will receive this money. Mr. Keck explained how NCCI sets fee schedules and how the schedules work. Mr. Worthington addressed how it will affect the self-insured. Sen. Keene asked if state organizations would benefit from this immediately. Mr. Worthington said yes. Mr. Keck said it is the department's goal is to have the fee schedule in place by January 1, 2011.

Public Comments

Ms. Murdo distributed several handouts of public comment:

- Keith Ori, a Physical Therapist (PT), wrote about PT reimbursement rates. (Exhibit 8)
- The Rehabilitation Association of Montana, offering recommendations (Exhibit 9) to be included in the LC Imac bill draft proposal.
- 01:29:23 Bill Dahlgren, Missoula, the owner of several sporting goods stores, said he also represents the management side of LMAC. He said the time is right to go forward with the bill draft proposal. He said there was a compromise between the stakeholders.
- O1:31:33 Riley Johnson, representing the National Federation of Independent Businesses, and a member of the LMAC work group, talked about a program called WorkSafeMT. He said the LMAC represents the people who pay and receive the benefits of the program. He responded to Sen. Brown's question regarding whether any savings would be passed on to the employer. Mr. Johnson said there is some information on this issue, but at this time it is a separate issue. Mr. Johnson said that loss costs needs to come down before it can be determined if there is a benefit. He stated his support of the LCImac bill draft.
- O1:33:57 Erin MacLean, representing the Montana Medical Association, read a letter from Dr. Steele addressing the reimbursement cuts to providers. (Exhibit 10) Dr. Steele noted in his letter that a 10% drop in access to care could be substantial in Montana. Ms. MacLean said she does not agree with the bill draft as proposed and asked that LMAC look at other recommendations rather than take the cuts out of the medical providers' pockets.
- O1:46:09 Richard Martin, Attorney, Great Falls, discussed problems he sees in the bill draft. He said that some of the problems are: 1) the frequency of injuries due to unsafe working conditions, 2) the bill draft does not address employers' accountability, and 3) the stay-at-work/return-to-work program is forcing people to return to work when they are not healed. He gave other reasons why some of the changes will not work, such as medical expenses are 80% of the costs. He asked that LMAC address some of these issues so a bill can be passed through the Legislature.

- O1:49:49 Aimee Grmoljez, representing Billings Clinic, addressed two issues: 1) lower medical providers' rates and 2) the utilization and treatment guidelines. She said there will be longer wait times for treatment of workers' compensation claims and there will be an added burden on providers in small rural areas who will no longer see workers' compensation patients. She added that the Billings Clinic opposes rate cuts. She said the injured worker will not get back to work early. She distributed a handout from Kristianne B. Wilson, Vice President of Strategic Development, Billings Clinic, that talks about who will be affected and the expected workload the proposal will add to medical staff. (Exhibit 11)
- 01:53:28 Jim Larson, representing the Teamsters Union, said on behalf of the 4,500 teamster members, the Teamsters Union supports the LCImac bill draft.
- O1:53:53 David Whitehall, Attorney, Missoula, talked about wage loss benefits, and his clients who cannot return to work and need these benefits to pay their bills. He said the bill is a theory, and it will not work the way it is intended.
- 01:58:37 Marv Jordan, Montana Contractors Compensation Fund -- a self insured contractors' fund within the state, said MCCF concurs with the LMAC bill because of the need for change.
- O1:59:07 Al Smith, representing the Montana Trial Lawyers Association, talked about the irregularities of the proposal, and he said it can be achieved in a much simpler way and at lower costs. He said the proposal does not address safety in the work place. He asked the committee to hold off until there are more facts to back up changes related to using impairment for benefit calculations. He asked that no workers be left behind.
- 02:02:53 Nancy Butler, Montana State Fund (MSF), said that MSF opposes two areas:
 1) going back to the 5th addition of the American Medical Association guidelines for impairment ratings from the current 6th addition, and 2) a provision that requires insurers to pay attorney fees if a worker succeeds in a medical dispute.

Ms. Butler talked about the fee schedule and commented on the NCCI presentation Exhibit 3 and the lack of flexibility for workers to return to work.

O2:05:13

Jacqueline Lenmark, representing the American Insurance Association on behalf of Plan 2 work comp insurers, said she is also speaking for Bruce Spencer, Property Casualty Insurance Association, and Larry Jones of Liberty Northwest. She commended LMAC for its hard work. She concurred with Ms. Butler regarding the insurance companies preference to use the current 6th edition for impairment ratings and stated that going back to the 5th addition goes against insurance companies' policies. She noted that the statute now says the "current" edition. She said that workers' compensation is priced differently from other insurance in Montana; it is governed by statute and private insurers are regulated through the Commissioner of Insurance (the State Auditor's Office). She said that NCCI requires insurers to be members and to adopt a filed advisory rate, which is subject to prior approval by the Commissioner of Insurance. The statute states that the rates cannot be:

- excessive,
- inadequate, and
- unfairly discriminatory.

Ms. Lenmark described the insurance companies' rating process and how they compete through their expense components. If there are savings, she said, they will be passed on to the employers through their rates. She said the insurance companies believe that the LMAC bill will save dollars.

- D2:12:07 Laurence Hubbard, CEO, Montana State Fund (MSF), talked about compromises that will need to be made. He stated that LMAC has identified true cost drivers in the workers' comp system in Montana. He noted that there are no facts to back up the impairment issue. He also said that there are no benefits for workers when 40% of them are left out of the equation. He said that MSF follows the law so the rates are not excessive. He talked about still paying the unfunded liability under the "Old Fund". He discussed the statutes stating that MSF is more conservative and not-for-profit motivated.
- 02:17:30 Bonnie Lyytinen-Hale, representing Headwaters and the Rehabilitation Association of Montana, offered recommendations as noted in her handout (Exhibit 9), to be included in the LClmac bill draft.
- 02:18:59 Bob Olsen, Montana Hospital Association, said he questions the affect the proposed LCImac bill draft medical fee revisions would have on medical providers. He stated there were no medical providers on the LMAC committee.

EAI comments and questions

- O2:24:41 Sen. Zinke commented about no provisions in the bill regarding safety and fraud. He is in favor of the bill, stating it is a best chance, and it can be tweaked in the upcoming Legislature.
- O2:30:27 Rep. Hunter commended the LMAC members for their hard work and input on the bill draft proposal, LClmac. He talked about the medical part of the bill draft and discussed some of the issues to be addressed such as the Utilization and Treatment Guidelines. He said the bill needs to go forward for the 2011 Legislature to work on.
- 02:32:50 Rep. Reinhart commented on the impairment rating concerns and getting workers back to work. She said that injured workers have not come forward to say how it will benefit them. She said from her perspective wage loss should be looking at the workers' wages.
- 02:35:40 Sen. Keene addressed the committee stating that workers' compensation was the number 1 issue that the Legislature assigned the EAI committee. He said the bill isn't perfect, but it needs to go forward as is.

Update on SJR 14 Study - Reports on stakeholder meetings. Recommendation review

Hope Stockwell, staff for SJR 14 Study

Ms. Stockwell introduced Dr. Bill Layton, director of the Montana Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory (VDL) in Bozeman, who was present via poly comphone. Ms. Stockwell distributed a report (Exhibit 12) that provides an update reflecting conversations involving the Department of Livestock, the Board of Livestock, Department of Fish, Wildlife, and Parks, and Montana State University (MSU) on the possibility of a combined laboratory for the VDL and the Wildlife lab or related options of working together. She asked that the committee send a draft letter (Exhibit 13) to Dr. Beverly Byrum, chair of the Accreditation Committee for veterinary diagnostic laboratories,. The accreditation committee will have a meeting in November to review the lab situation.

O3:02:09 Dr. Layton thanked the committee for its deliberation on this issue. He said accreditation is very important.

03:03:35 Rep. Vance made the motion to send the letter to Dr. Byrum. See Exhibit 13. The motion **passed**. Sen. Hansen voted aye by proxy.

AGENCY BILL DRAFT REVIEW

03:06:35 Jesse Laslovich distributed and explained the draft legislation of nine bills from the State Auditor's Office. (Exhibit 14)

EAI comments and questions

O3:22:41 Sen. Zinke talked about the national health care reform bill, and said that the word "exchange' was left off of the bill draft. He asked if the health care model is based on the Massachusetts or Utah model. Mr. Laslovich said it doesn't look like it is modeled after either state. He noted that various portions of the national health care bill are before the committee now, because the national deadline requires some portions to be in place by January 2013.

Public Comment

- 03:26:05 Frank Cote, Government Relations, Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Montana (BC/BS MT), said BC/BS MT is willing to work with the State Auditor on the health reform bills and expects solutions will be found during the 2011 Legislature.
- O3:27:06 Tanya Ask, New West Health Services, offered several suggestions for the committee to consider: 1) the need for one set of regulations to keep overall administrative costs down, and 2) the importance of local regulation of insurance in a rural state, which will make medical services better for the people of Montana.
- 03:28:15 Mona Jamison, lobbyist for the Montana Life and Health Insurance Guaranty Association, said the Association has requested the SAO to put forward bill proposal No. 5, adopting model language for the Montana Guaranty Association. She said this model is the best consumer act in Montana, because it will protect policyholders if a company becomes insolvent or is impaired. She said in some cases the Montana law is better than the model act.
- O3:30:14 Claudia Clifford, Montana AARP, said that AARP supports the health care reform bill draft requests. She asked the committee to move these bill drafts forward for consideration in the 2011 Legislature and noted the importance of local regulation.
- O3:31:34 Sen. Brown commented that other states have challenged health care reform as not Constitutional. He noted that other options are to opt out of federal health care reform. Sen. Keene said the committee is only allowing the Secretary Auditor's Office to move the proposal forward for discussion at the 2011 Legislature. Sen. Zinke clarified that the proposals are just for drafting purposes.

Motion

- 03:34:56 Rep. Reinhart made the motion to move the nine proposals forward for drafting. The motion **passed** 5-3. Sen. Brown, Rep. Vance and Rep. Roberts voted no. Sen. Hansen voted aye by proxy.
- 03:37:32 Mr. Laslovich asked a question about the process of sponsoring a bill. Ms. Murdo and Mr. Campbell explained how the sponsorship of a bill goes forward.

04:57:14 Rep. Vance called the committee back to order at 1:00 p.m.

Energy Prices in 2010 as Related to Economic Development John FitzPatrick, NorthWestern Energy (NWE)

- 04:57:31 Mr. Fitzpatrick distributed information and talked about the outlook of the economy in Montana (**Exhibit 15**), and electricity prices in Montana. (**Exhibit 16**)
- The committee discussed: the use of coal; how NWE negotiates prices; the economy not recovering at least until 2020; and biomass, infrastructure, and permitting.

- Ms. Murdo distributed a memo written by Richard D. Liebert, Lt. Colonel (retired, Army) regarding the use of Malmstrom Air Force Base for a Strategic Biofuel Program (SBP) for the production of clean energy. The memo was one he sent to Montana Senator Jon Tester. (Exhibit 17)
- 05:32:58 Keith Kelly, DLI Commissioner, distributed information and explained the department's proposed housekeeping bills and bill drafts. He noted there is one stand-alone board bill, which is not being requested by the department but by the Board of Real Estate Appraisers. (Exhibit 18)

Motion

There was no public comment. The motion was made for DLI to go forward with the proposed housekeeping bills and bill drafts (Exhibit 18). The motion **passed**. Sen. Hansen voted aye by proxy.

Department of Commerce

Dore Schwinden, Director of the Department of Commerce, talked about two agency proposals. One is to address the quality schools grant program. The second proposal is to incorporate wind and solar energy into schools and school studies.

Motion

- O5:46:05 Sen. Zinke made the motion to approve the agency's proposal. The motion **passed.** Sen. Hansen voted aye by proxy.
- O5:46:22 Cort Jensen, attorney for the Department of Agriculture, discussed two proposed bill drafts, which he distributed and explained to the committee: 1) a change to allow commodity dealer bonds (Exhibit 19) and 2) a bill addressing a judicial process for dealing with landowners on noxious weed concerns (Exhibit 20).

Motion

O5:50:28 Sen. Zinke made the motion to accept both proposed bill drafts. The motion **passed.** Sen. Hansen voted aye by proxy.

Review of Montana Heritage Preservation and Development Commission (MHC) indirect administrative rate

- Paul Reichert, Executive Director
- Mr. Reichert talked about an article about the MHC printed in the New York Times as having the most ambitious preservation projects in the nation. (Exhibit 21) He also distributed a handout showing projects and activities of Virginia City and Nevada City, two of Montana's best preserved territorial town sites. (Exhibit 22)

Update on Distressed Wood Products Revolving Loan Program (HB 669) Dore Schwinden, Department of Commerce

Dore Schwinden introduced Andy Poole, deputy director, Department of Commerce, who reviewed a report on the Wood Products Revolving Loan Fund. (Exhibit 23)

Review of Medical Impairment Subcommittee Proposals

- Rep. Roberts and Rep. Hunter
- 06:02:24 Rep. Roberts gave an overview of the medical impairment proposed bill draft, LCmihp. **(Exhibit 24)**
- During public comment, Emery Jones, Montana Nurses Assistance Program, said he has a problem with Section 3, subsection (d) of LCmihp (Exhibit 24) regarding relapses. He explained the process for a person who enters a medical assistance program and whose license may be suspended. He said the language should be clarified regarding relapses when the person is actively working and under a program contract. He also noted the need to differentiate between treatment programs and assistance programs.
- Dr. David Johnson commented via phone that the panel is against medical staff being required to pay for this service when they make application to apply for a license to work. Rep. Roberts talked about the three-strike provision of the bill draft. Rep. Hunter noted that the licensing boards would pay for the audits.
- O6:22:24 Sen. Zinke commented about his concern about privilege and half-steps or passes when a person breaks a law. Mr. Campbell raised a concern about existing language reiterated in the proposed bill draft (Exhibit 24) about physical impairments due to a chronic physical illness. He questioned whether this is a problem under the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- 06:24:35 Ms. Murdo talked about additional language for the proposed bill draft, LCmihp attached to Exhibit 24, standardizing language and attaching the three-strikes to a contract provision.

Motion

06:27:17 Rep. Roberts made the motion to approve LCmihp as a committee bill with the suggested changes. A roll call vote was taken. **(Exhibit 25)** The motion **passed** 6 - 2. Sen. Zinke and Rep. Vance voted no. Sen. Hansen voted aye by proxy.

Review of SJR 30 Committee Bills, Study Report and Recommendations Overview of Issues - Pat Murdo, Bart Campbell, Kris Wilkinson, and Matt Stayner, staff

- Ms. Wilkinson distributed a handout updating the cost analysis of implementing a bill that will provide a financial and compliance audit of the State Fund, to be conducted by the Legislative Auditor's Office every five years. **(Exhibit 26)**
- Rep. Reinhart's proposals of Montana State Fund regulation LCfund
 06:32:41 Rep. Reinhart explained that the bill draft proposal, LCfund (Exhibit 27) would provide better service for the people of Montana.
- 06:35:25 Laurence Hubbard, president and CEO of Montana State Fund, commented that he does not agree with Rep. Reinhart's comments. He stated that he cannot support the bill as proposed, and gave his reasons why.

- O6:39:57 Jacqueline Lenmark, American Insurance Association, and reporting for Bruce Spencer of the Property Casualty Insurance Association, and Larry Jones of Liberty Northwest, said they all support full regulation of Montana State Fund. She said the bill draft, LCfund would give the Legislature and the committee some information to work with for comparison of plans.
- O6:42:15 Sen. Brown referenced the importance of reducing costs for workers' compensation and questioned how the rate payers would pay for the increased costs of regulation.
- O6:43:16 Rep. Hunter commented if there is to be a rate review that this committee should provide the guidelines so LAD would know what to audit. Rep. Reinhart asked if LAD could audit State Fund with their legislative enabling authority. Rep. Hunter said that LAD could, but probably wouldn't. At Rep. Reinhart's request, Kris Wilkinson commented on the types of reviews that LAD does in contrast to what the bill proposal requests, specifically market conduct and financial examinations.
- 06:46:58 The committee discussed timelines that should be used for auditing State Fund and the associated costs. There were several suggestions from no less than five years to having an audit every year.
- 06:48:52 Rep. Reinhart discussed the value of the State Auditor having a role in reviewing the State Fund's practices or if the Legislative Audit Division review was sufficient. She asked about trimming several parts of the bill draft, such as claims management and best practices. She noted that Montana taxpayers could be on the hook if anything goes wrong with State Fund. She said that State Fund could find ways to cut costs for policyholders, such as not performing audits every year.
- O6:51:14 Rep. Hunter asked how often private insurance companies in the work comp industry go through a market conduct review? Ms. Lenmark replied it can be done at any time at the discretion of the Commissioner of Insurance, but no less than five years. Rep. Hunter said it is important that State Fund offer the product at the least cost that can given the proper administration of the program. But, being in a competitive market, State Fund is expected to compete with the private market. His dilemma is the fairness issue, but he would support a market conduct exam.
- 06:52:54 Rep. Reinhart recommended that subsection (2) of the bill draft, LCfund, be removed, and have audits performed every five years. She said that LAD can deal with all the pieces when they perform an audit.

The motion passed. Sen. Hansen voted ave by proxy. Rep. Hunter's proposal to revise Montana State Fund board composition 07:21:40 Rep. Hunter said LCLch2 addresses the State Fund board. (Exhibit 30) He provided background information stating the bill draft is about the experiences that the board members bring to the board. The bill deletes the requirement for an insurance producer to be on the board, such as an insurance agent or broker. 07:26:00 Mr. Hubbard explained the experience that each citizen board member brings to State Fund. Definition of an Order

- 07:48:54 Rep. Vance gave an overview of the proposed bill draft, LClive, which gives a definition of an "Order" for the Department of Livestock (Exhibit 34) He explained that an order would become a directive authorized by statue when issued by the Department of Livestock and the Board of Livestock.
- O7:50:19 Sen. Debbie Barrett, SD 36, said that LClive goes too far regarding the length of time and costs of an Order to the department, and it is not what she intended. Her only concern is with Order 1001D, which is not an order, but a state program. She has been informed by the Department of Livestock that the Designated Surveillance Area (DSA), is a state program with oversight from the USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS).
