**** Joint Resolution No. **** 1 Introduced By ********** 2 3 By Request of the Law and Justice Interim Committee A Joint Resolution of the Senate and the House of Representatives 5 6 of the State of Montana requesting an interim study to examine 7 the occurrence, causes, investigation, reporting, and prevention 8 of suicides in county and city jails. 9 10 WHEREAS, the suicide of persons in county and city jails is a traumatic experience both for the victim's families and for the 11 12 detention staff of the jails in which suicides occur; and WHEREAS, political subdivisions of the state that operate 13 detention facilities have a constitutional duty arising under the 14 15 Eighth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution to operate an effective 16 suicide prevention program to help prevent suicide of inmates in 17 those facilities; and WHEREAS, reduction of the risk of suicides in county and 18 19 city jails has been a concern to the Legislatures for some time 20 because of that constitutional duty and because if that 21 constitutional duty is unfulfilled, not only do suicides occur 22 but survivors of persons who commit suicides in those jails 23 sometimes bring law suits, which some detention facility staff 24 have estimated to occur in as many as 70 to 80 percent of the

suicides in a county jail, resulting in money judgments or

WHEREAS, during the 2007-2008 interim, the Law and Justice

Interim Committee studied ways to prevent or reduce the number of 2 those suicides and that study resulted in the introduction of 3 4 House Bill 60 in the 61st Legislative Session, creating a jail 5 suicide reduction pilot program patterned after a successful program in Kentucky that won national attention and awards; and 6 7 WHEREAS, House Bill 60 was supported by many interest groups, including the Montana Sheriff and Peace Officers' 8 9 Association, but the bill was killed by the House Appropriations 10 Committee in the 61st Legislature because of funding issues; and WHEREAS, since the introduction of House Bill 60 until 11 12 January 1, 2010, at least five persons committed suicide in county jails, out of a jail population of approximately 2,000 13 14 inmates, the resulting rate of suicide being considerably above the rate for suicides in county and city jails nationally, using 15 16 the most recently available figures in a 2010 study done for the 17 National Institute of Corrections of the U.S. Department of 18 Justice; and 19 WHEREAS, the Legislature would prefer to treat the issue of 20 suicides in county and city jails as part of a more comprehensive 21 solution to the problem of providing mental health treatment and the creation of secure beds both at the state and community 22 23 level, but funding is not available for the creation of that 24 system and those beds and the Legislature therefore needs to 25 address the problem of suicides in county and city jails more quickly in smaller, more incremental, and less expensive steps, 26 27 because suicides more suicides will undoubtedly occur if the

legislature waits until it can fund a more comprehensive mental 1 health treatment system with secure beds than if the Legislature 2 takes more immediate smaller steps; and 3 WHEREAS, Montana has an unreliable method of determining how 5 many suicides occur in local jails every year, that method being the electronic searching of death certificates by the Department 6 of Public Health and Human Services, for which even that 7 Department has cautioned that "no such search technique can be 8 9 comprehensive" and that the lists of jail suicides produced by 10 the Department by that searching method therefore "may be 11 incomplete"; and 12 WHEREAS, the Montana Sheriffs' and Peace Officers' Association is now developing and fielding a system of peer 13 14 review of county jails for compliance with its voluntary jail/detention standards and that it may be possible for the 15 16 Legislature to find some way to support or augment that review 17 program in a coordinated manner; and 18 WHEREAS, the Legislature may find a way through the study of 19 the prevention of suicides in county and city jails to help 20 reduce the risk of suicides in those jails and thereby prevent 21 some of those suicides in a manner that is not as expensive as House Bill 60 or the creation of community mental health services 22 and secure treatment beds at the state or local level. 23 24 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE 25 OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF MONTANA: 26 That the Legislative Council be requested to designate an appropriate interim committee, pursuant to 5-5-217, MCA, or 27
