Organic Commodity Advisory Council

Administrative Appointments: By Department of Agriculture Director

Statutorily Established - 80-11-601, MCA, within Title 80, chapter 11, part 6 dealing with organic certification. Subsection (4) says that after the department receives and verifies a petition from 50% of more of Montana's certified organic producers, processors, and handlers that the department is to implement an organic certification program and establish an organic commodity advisory council.

Purposes:

By statute, advise the department on the organic certification program, regarding:

- rules to implement the program;
- appropriate research and market development programs for certified organic products and the terms for awarding research and marketing contracts;
- assessments to be paid on certified organic products "payable by certified organic producers, processors, and handlers... when approved by a majority of those producers, processors, and handlers..."; and
- collection and enforcement procedures for assessments.

By rule, review annually the state's certification program activities and a sampling of certification decisions.

Council Members: No specified number in statute. Rules provide for 8 members.

Members must be: the director of the Department of Agriculture; a consumer member of the public at large; and 4 certified organic producers, 1 certified organic producer or handler representative appointed at large, and 1 certified organic handler who must be an owner or employee of a certified organic handler. (The statute allowed appointments of organic processors.) By statute the majority of the council must be organic producers.

Budget

Annual meetings are not tracked separately from the program but are estimated by the department at \$750 a year.

The organic program budget comes from application fees, fees for services, and annual assessment fees, all set by rule.

The assessment fees, found in 4.17.107 ARM, are:

- 1% of gross sales or organic crops, livestock, and products for certified producers.
- \$25 for handlers whose gross sales and handling charges are less than \$5,000 a year;
- \$50 for handlers with annual gross sales and handling charges of \$5,000 to \$20,000;
- \$100 for handlers with annual gross sales and handling charges of \$20,001 to \$40,000;
- \$200 for handlers with annual gross sales and handling charges of \$40,001 to \$100,000;
- \$500 for handlers with annual gross sales and handling charges of \$100,001 to \$250,000;
- \$1,000 for handlers with annual gross sales and handling charges of \$250,001 to \$500,000;
- \$2,000 for handlers with annual gross sales and handling charges of \$500,001 to \$1 million;
- \$4,000 for handlers with annual gross sales and handling charges of over \$1 million.

Examples of application fees for producers, found in 4.17.106 ARM, are:

- \$165 for operations with less than \$20,000 in gross annual sales;
- \$200 for operations with between \$20,000 and \$100,000 in gross sales annually;
- \$300 for operations with more than \$100,000 in gross sales annually; and
- \$150 for new certification applications.

Examples of application fees for handlers, found in 4.17.106 ARM, are:

- \$215 for each facility with less than \$20,000 in sales annually;
- \$250 for each facility with annual sales of between \$20,000 and \$100,000;
- \$400 for each facility with annual sales of more than \$100,000.

Topics of Interest

- There is a continual review of production and handling standards, including what substances may be allowed or should be prohibited for use on organic products.
