COMMITTEE ACTION

- The committee approved the Office of the Secretary of State's proposed legislation for bill drafting purposes.
- The committee retained the following advisory councils: the State Employee Group Benefits Advisory Council, the Capitol Complex Advisory Council, the Electronic Government Advisory Council, the Information Technology Board, the 911 Advisory Council, the Land Information Advisory Council, and the Employee Investment Advisory Council.
- The committee retained the following advisory council reports: the Electronic Government Advisory Council Report, the Information Technology Report, and the Montana Land Information Report.
- The committee decided that the Capitol Complex Advisory Council Report, the Employee Incentive Program Report, and the Uniform Commercial Code Secured Transactions Report be given to the SAVA committee by September 15 in the year preceding the session and if there are no changes to the Code, then a presentation is not necessary.
- The committee approved adding the language of 19-2-405(5), MCA to the experience study of the Teachers' Retirement System.
- The committee approved adding language to 19-2-405(2) that the actuaries provide copies of the Annual Report - CAFR to the Legislature.
- The committee approved the staff's recommendation to require the Board of Investments' report be provided to SAVA before September 15 of the year preceding a legislative session.
- The committee approved LCsa04 for preintroduction purposes with Sen. Arthun as sponsor of the bill.
- The committee approved a motion that the funding analysis of TRS to not include benefit changes.
- The committee approved amending a previous motion (track funding of the retirement systems at 100% and 107%, both for 30 years and for 40 years, and compare both) to tract funding at 100% only but for 30 years and for 40 years for comparison purposes.

00:02:00 Sheri Scurr gave an overview of the agenda and meeting materials.

HB 142 - REVIEW OF STATUTORY ADVISORY COUNCILS AND REPORTS

Staff Overview

Ms. Scurrs gave a brief overview of HB 142. She said that the Land Information Advisory Council is on page 14 of the document "HB 142 - Review of Statutory Advisory Councils and Reports (Exhibit 20).

• Land Information Advisory Council - Jennie Stapp, State Librarian

00:05:58 Ms. Stapp gave a presentation of the Montana Land Information Act, the Montana Land Information Advisory Council (MLIAC), and recent changes that have occurred within state government to better collect and disseminate land or geographical information. She distributed a copy of 90-1-404, MCA, the statute that governs the Land Information (Exhibit 21).

Committee questions

- 00:18:35 SEN. VAN DYK asked who administers the Cadastral System. **Ms. Stapp** said that the data comes through the Department of Revenue, the State Library, and the staff who manages the Cadastral application.
- 00:19:24 **Stu Kirkpatrick, State GIS Coordinator**, said the Montana Cadastral database that is integrated by the eight largest counties in Montana have their own GIS and data from those counties come through the Department of Revenue. That data is published in a variety of forms, one being the Cadastral website.
- O0:20:23 SEN. VAN DYK said that one of the things that he can't tell is which properties are in what management for recreational purposes. He asked if there was a layer for that type of data. **Mr. Kirkpatrick** said that the data in the Block Management Program is collected by Fish, Wildlife, and Parks, and is available through the FWP Hunt Planner.
- 00:22:09 REP. INGRAHAM asked if a certain percentage of the \$.75 is set aside for grants. **Ms. Stapp** said that there is nothing in Administrative Rule that requires a certain percentage to be set aside. What is in Administrative Rule is an amount of funds for coordination dollars that staff the Council's travel and the remaining funds are decided through the Land Plan Process.
- 00:22:51 REP. INGRAHAM asked about the grant process that is occurring in bigger areas. **Ms. Stepp** said that there is a map in her handout that shows the areas of the state that have received those funds.

- 02:33:46 REP. INGRAHAM said that there was a motion yesterday to look at going at the 100% and the 107%. She asked if Mr. Senn thought that the committee should concentrate on the 100% at this point for the 30 and 40 years, get to that point, and then rely what the reserves are.
- 02:34:19 Mr. Senn said he recommends sticking with 100% funding over a 30-year period.
- 02:35:31 SEN. JENT said the committee should modify its previous decision to change the 107% funding to 100% funding.
- 02:35:59 REP. INGRAHAM said that the committee did have the 100%, and in that same motion, there was the 30-year and the 40-year, keeping the 40-year and eliminating the 107%.
