
Montana State Hospital



Cost of contracted medical staff rocketed to \$820,000 in 2014 from \$32,000 in 2012. 4 psychiatrists left in 2012, and another 2 left in 2015.

Montana State Prison

- 1,500 inmates.
- 2 telepsychiatrists from Illinois, 20hrs weekly at \$160/hr.
- One of the largest providers of MH services in MT.





Montana State Prison

On a daily basis, the Montana Department of Corrections oversees approximately 1,490 men incarcerated at the Montana State Prison in Deer Lodge and 200 women at the Montana Women's Prison in Billings.

Like other prisons and jails throughout the nation, Montana's correctional system is the largest de facto mental health provider in the state. In addition, chemical dependency is the norm in the prison population. At the Women's Prison in Billings, Warden Joan Daly, MS, LCPC, has introduced a recovery/reentry model that acknowledges that the vast majority of female offenders are also victims who have suffered significant trauma earlier in their lives.

Mental health services are a vital part of the treatment many inmates need. But attracting and retaining qualified mental health staff is an ongoing challenge for the department. We are fortunate to have a great mental health team within the department, but the need for services always exceeds our resources. We are currently recruiting for both psychiatrist positions at the men's prison and, in the interim, are providing services via tele-psychiatry.







How to Build a Psychiatrist

- Different than a PSYCHOLOGIST.
- College (pre-med) = 4yrs
- Medical School (MD or DO) = 4yrs
 - Can't practice medicine yet.
- Residency (board certification) = 4yrs
 - Docs tend to stay where they FINISH training



- Copy a successful model:
 - Boise, ID
 - 63% in-state retention 2007-2014.
 - Spokane, WA
 - 83% in-state retention 2010-2014.
