Legislative Bills for 2019 Legislative Session

- 1. Repeal meal and poultry inspection appeals process. Responds to an audit by the USDA Food Safety Inspection Service.
- 2. Revises language of meat and poultry inspection laws to maintain a "meets or exceeds" designation from USDA. Impacts language in 81-1-102, MCA, regarding home-killed meats, which the department said may be interpreted to mean home-killed meat could enter retail commerce.
- 3. Adjust livestock per capita fee language so that revenue collected in May is recognized at the beginning of the next fiscal year.
- 4. Clean up outdated and redundant language regarding state import requirements for animals, animal semen, and biologics. Includes a repeal of Title 81, chapter 2, part 4, regarding regulation of semen used for artificial insemination.
- 5. Revise reference to deposit of aerial hunting permit fees to ensure the money is deposited in a state special revenue account to offset the administrative costs of managing the service.
- 6. Remove the set statutory amount for livestock dealer application fees with the intent of setting the fee by rule. Currently the fee is set at \$50. Last adjustment was in 1995.
- 7. Remove residency requirements for obtaining aerial hunting permits to allow landowners to better mitigate conflict with predators such as coyotes and foxes.
- 8. Change the deadline for applying for livestock per capita refunds to better reflect the 2015 legislative revision in fee collection date.
