2001 The legislature added local government to the Education Interim

2001-2008 ELG created a PEPB subcommittee each interim

2009-2014 Shared Policy Goals for K-12, K-20, MUS were established between ELG, SPI, BPE, and the Regents (not to be confused with the Shared Policy Goals that the Section E subcommittee has been establishing with the

MUS in recent sessions)

2017 The legislature divided ELG into EDIC and LGIC

> EDIC's enabling statute was amended to remove old PEPB duties related to fiscal oversight of the MUS; interim committee review of statewide

ballot initiatives added as statutory requirement
