MCA 20 -9-236. Transfer of funds improvements to school safety and security.

(1) A school district that has certified to the office of public instruction a current school safety plan or emergency operations plan pursuant to 20-1-401 transfer state or local revenue funds for improvements to school and student safety and security as follows:

- a) planning for improvements to and maintenance of school and student sa fety, and staffing
- b) programs and training for school employees, students, parents, and community members approved
- c) installing or updating locking mechanisms and ingress and egress systems at public school access points
- d) installing or updating bullet-resistant windows and barriers
- e) Installing or updating emergency response systems

SB 213 (2023)

THREAT ASSESSMENT PROTOCOL:

SCHOOLS MUST ADOPT A PROTOCOL THAT DEFINES POLICIES AND PROCEDURES FOR RESPONDING TO STUDENT THREATS OF HARM TO OTHERS OR PROPERTY.

THREAT ASSESSMENT TEAM:

EACH SCHOOL MUST IDENTIFY A TEAM COMPOSED OF KEY STAFF (E.G., ADMINISTRATORS, COUNSELORS, LAW ENFORCEMENT LIAISONS) THAT MEETS AT LEAST MONTHLY TO REVIEW AND RESPOND TO THREATS.

ANNUAL REVIEW:

SAFETY PLANS, INCLUDING THREAT ASSESSMENT PROCEDURES, MUST BE REVIEWED ANNUALLY AND UPDATED AS NEEDED.

USE OF SAFETY FUNDS:

DISTRICTS MAY USE SCHOOL SAFETY FUNDS TO SUPPORT THREAT ASSESSMENT TRAINING, TEAM COORDINATION, AND RELATED SAFETY MEASURES.

20 -1-401: DISASTER DRILLS REQUIRES EACH SCHOOL DISTRICT TO CONDUCT REGULAR DISASTER DRILLS, INCLUDING:

- FIRE DRILLS
- EARTHQUAKE DRILLS
- LOCKDOWN DRILLS
- EVACUATION DRILLS

SCHOOL BOARDS MUST IDENTIFY LOCAL HAZARDS AND INCORPORATE THEM INTO A SCHOOL SAFETY PLAN.

PLANS MUST BE REVIEWED AND UPDATED ANNUALLY.

COORDINATION WITH LOCAL EMERGENCY SERVICES (FIRE, LAW ENFORCEMENT, EMS) IS ENCOURAGED.
