### What is an Interstate Compact?



Legislatively enacted agreement (contract) among states



**Enables states to cooperatively address shared problems** 



Preserves state sovereignty over issues belonging to states



### **Interstate Compact Enactments**

275+ compacts

Each state has enacted between 20-80 compacts





43 compact enactments per state on average

2,200 total compact enactments

### Constitutionality

### Article I, Section 10 of the US Constitution

No State shall, without the Consent of Congress...enter into any Agreement or Compact with another State.



### Constitutionality

### Virginia v Tennessee (1893)


U.S. Supreme Court concluded that compacts require congressional consent only when they could infringe upon federal authority or alter the federal balance of power.



# Options for Federal Involvement in Interstate Compacts

- Congressional Consent (if needed)
- Financial Support
- Technical Expertise and Assistance
- Participation in Compact Commissions





- 1. Compact legislation is developed specifically for a policy need
- 2. A state joins the compact by enacting the model legislation
- 3. The provisions of the compact take effect once the prerequisite number of states have joined



# Common Components of Compact Legislation

### **How Interstate Compacts Start**

### Policy Problem

- Policy area that transcends state borders
- Patchwork of state laws and processes
- Inaction at the federal level

### Policy Start

- Interested policymaker(s)
- Interest from key policy stakeholder(s)
- Federal funding opportunity
- Federal consent



### **How Interstate Compacts Start**

- Project Research
  - Viability of compact or other multistate solution
- Stakeholder alignment
  - Project supporters
  - Funding

### **Development of Compact Language**



The **Technical Assistance Group** will make recommendations on compact language based on essential aspects of the policy area



The **Document Team** will create an initial draft based on recommendations from the Technical Assistance Group.



# Stakeholder Review and Compact Finalization



- Once an initial draft of the language is complete it will be made public and distributed to key stakeholders
- The results of the stakeholder review are shared with the working groups for consideration
- Working groups then finalize model compact legislation

- Identification of policy components for interstate compact consideration



### **Legal Services**

- Compact attorneys specialized in compact law
- Assistance during drafting, enactment, and operationalization phases of the compact

### **Convening and Facilitation**

- As a non-partisan membership organization, CSG is a neutral facilitator
- Experience working across states on shared issues
- Defined development process

- Legislative testimony
- Legislation review

## **Electric Transmission Line Siting Compact**

- Energy Policy Act of 2005 authorized compact development
- Compact legislation completed in 2012 as a CSG memberdriven initiative
- Compact legislation provides for uniform process for state project review and approval
