





## Buildings that in Western Europe would have elevators instead are walk-ups in the U.S.







# Three major policy problems: cabin size, technical standard, and other building code items








### Cabin sizes in the U.S. are huge...

#### We have all sorts of other code requirements too...






Elevator may not share a shaft with a stairway in the U.S. (comon and allowed abroad) Only country in the world to not accept elevator landing doors as adequate to prevent smoke spread in basic buildings

### Options for regulatory reform

Process for change	Pros	Cons
Code development	<ul> <li>Cleaner and more adaptable</li> <li>More technically informed</li> <li>Laser focused on safety of new buildings</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Slow (changes take multiple three-year code cycles)</li> <li>Structurally biased against multifamily affordability</li> <li>More susceptible to manufacturer lobbying</li> </ul>
Legislative	<ul> <li>Faster</li> <li>More concerned with affordability</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Inflexible (new legislation must be passed when circumstances change)</li> <li>More susceptible to developer lobbying</li> <li>More opportunity for technical error</li> </ul>
