Legal Authority & Mission


- Governed by Title 41,
 Montana Code Annotated
- Declaration of Purpose:
 MCA 41-5-102
- Mission: Promote accountability, rehabilitation, and community safety

Structure & Jurisdiction

- Operates within Montana's District Courts
- District Court Judges are assigned to sit as Youth Court judges and oversee local youth court services
- Chief Juvenile Probation Officers and local youth court services provide intervention and supervision
- Jurisdiction: youth ages up to 18 for delinquency, status offenses, and
 - up to 25 for select situations under MCA
 - technically no minimum age in MCA

- Risk/needs assessments
- Individual case planning
- Diversion & restorative justice programs
- Supervision & monitoring


Youth Court Process Flow



 - Number of Referrals


REFERRALS TO MONTANA'S YOUTH COURTS


Youth Referred to Youth Court:	3,117

OFFENSE CATEGORIES










TOP 10 OFFENSES



TYPE OF DISPOSITION USED

Informal: Referral handled by Juvenile Probation Officer

Formal: Referral in which youth appears before Youth Court Judge


Dismissed: Referral in which case is dismissed by Juvenile Probation Officer, County Attorney,


or Court

Pending: Referral awaiting action from the County Attorney's Office or the Court, or a ticket

has been issued and Juvenile Probation is waiting to see the youth and parent(s),

or is awaiting further investigation by law enforcement

Current Challenges

- Limited resources & staffing
- Gaps in service availability
- Addressing disparities in outcomes

Opportunities

- Building off Council of State Governments Juvenile Justice Center work in MT
- Strengthening interagency collaboration
- Using data to guide targeted interventions
- Planned initiatives like the State Justice Institute Technical Assistance Grant, Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council
